

Scripture Isaiah 42:1-9

Summary

The Book of Isaiah contains several passages known as "Servant Songs" (42:1-9; 49:1-13; 50:4-11; 52:13-53:12; 61:1-4). These passages reveal the person and work of the Servant of the LORD. We are meant to learn about biblical servanthood by looking to this Servant, trusting in him, and following in his footsteps. In Isaiah 42:1-9, we learn that the Servant is obedient, humble, gentle and compassionate. His mission is to bring forth justice to the nations. We are all unfaithful, rebellious

servants. But God has sent His Servant to save sinners like us, for His own glory. We are called to humble ourselves, to trust in God's Servant, and to imitate his example of servanthood.

Sermon in a sentence

Jesus is the Servant-King who comes in humility, gentleness and compassion to save sinners. All who follow Jesus are to imitate his example of servanthood.

- 4. What are some things that hinder us from serving others in a Christ-like manner? What do we need to repent of in order to serve others more faithfully?
- 5. What are some ways that you can serve others in a Christ-like manner?
- 6. How can we encourage one another to serve?

"And Jesus called them to him and said to them, "You know that those who are considered rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great ones exercise authority over them. But sit shall not be so among you. But whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be first among you must be slave of all. For even the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mark 10:42-45)
